Overview Narrative:

The following summarizes committee work accomplished throughout this past year:

- 1. **Staff the University Senate Standing Committees.** Following selections for committee service, an affirmation vote was held at the August, 31 2020 University Senate meeting to appoint new members to the standing committees.
- 2. **Recruit Candidates for the Academic Assembly Elections.** In preparation for the annual spring elections, nominees from the academic assembly were received for campus president-elect and the elected committees in December 2021 and January 2021.
- 3. Facilitate the Academic Assembly Elections. The Committee Chair coordinates and oversees the academic assembly elections. The nominations process began with candidate recruitment in January 2021 and elections were held in March/April 2021 (March 31 April 7, 2021).

Anecdotally, it seems that many faculty and academic professionals who are not involved (or been involved in the past) with the Senate do not understand the importance of the Academic Assembly elections and faculty governance. The number of faculty and Aps who voted was low. While this could be for any number of reasons, one potential reason is failure to understand the process.
