Overview Narrative:

This year CAPC was able to review and respond to a near record large number of curricula proposals from the academic units. This was thanks to the dedicated work and expertise of Phyllis Lucie as well as to the commitment of the members of the committee. The CAPC Chair would also like to thank the representatives from the units that came to the meetings to support their proposals. Their availability to provide additional clarification to requests by committee members

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both during and immediately after the meeting was vital to the success of this year's work. I would also like to acknowledge the assistance of the technical team in working with the conferencing equipment that allowed committee members to attend from whatever location was most convenient, ensuring a quorum for all meetings.

Section II

Request for Consultations and/or topics reviewed by the committee and outcomes (topics reviewed by the committee decided not to act/review should be listed here with, no action taken):

During AY 2017-2018, CAPC will have convened 8 meetings. We reviewed 64 curricular proposals to date, with an additional 24 proposals scheduled for review during the final meeting on April 26, bringing the total to 88 proposals reviewed. During the fall of 2017, CAPC reviewed 31 proposals over 4 meetings, and in the spring of 2018, CAPC will have reviewed 57 proposals over 4 meetings. As of April 23, 2018, CAPC approved all 64 curricular proposal either during the committee meeting or when requested conditions were appropriately met by the proposers. During AY 2017-18, the University Senate voted approval of all CAPC approved curricular proposals.
