3. Provost's Report-Robert Page

The Provost has approved the hiring of 209 new faculty this year, which means a lot of work and activity within the academic units. Faculty members should be prepared to be part of the process to help hire the best faculty possible. Concerns such as faculty salary compression, career tracks and multiyear contract and merit increases will continue to be reviewed.

4. Informational Reports

a. Michael Thompson-Interim Chief of ASU Police

The features of the new LiveSafe app for smartphones were described. Students, faculty members and staff should be encouraged to download the app to increase safety on campus.

b. Rick Shangraw - CEO ASU Foundation

The ASU Foundation raised \$147 million last year. Until recently, more than 20 fees were assessed on gifts which has been reduced to two. With a \$25,000 contribution, faculty can support the Maroon and Gold scholarship which is matched by the university. A fundraising campaign will be launched in fall 2016.

c. Sethuraman Panchanathan - Sr. VP Office of Knowledge Enterprise Development

The University research enterprise is robust. There were \$425 million in research expenditures last year compared to \$120 million in 2002. \$1.67 billion in proposals went out last year. Entrepreneurship Magazine recognizes college entrepreneurs of the year, ASU is among the top five. Companies continue to locate and expand their enterprises in Arizona.

5. Senate Processes Overview-Chuck Barbee

Chuck presented an overview of Senate processes to help those who are new to the Senate so that units can be represented effectively. He discussed the purview of the Senate, the role of the UAC, Senate committees, the Senate meeting agenda as well as process innovations.

6. UAC Chair's Report – Helene Ossipov

Helene Ossipov reported on a variety of topics. The Arizona Board of Regents meeting was held a couple of weeks ago. The Regents are concerned about the pipeline; there is a need to inform students about college opportunities. Arizona citizens should know more about the importance of higher education. The University Senate is hosting a breakfast with faculty members and the Board of Regents. This event is scheduled for November 20, 2014.
