Recommendations: Cultural

Recommendation #1

Appoint a cabinet-level person responsible for organizing and coordinating institutional efforts.

Recommendation #2

Encourage, support and institutionalize an ethic of care related to issues of sexual assault, dating violence, domestic violence and stalking.

Recommendation #3

Involve the campus community in violence prevention and awareness.

Recommendation #4

Develop and execute a comprehensive plan for mandatory education on issues of sexual violence.

Consent is a clear, active, mutual and voluntary decision between partners.

Are smart about alcohol

Alcohol impairs judgment and reduces the ability to make clear decisions. Consent is not possible when alcohol or drugs are involved.

Are active bystanders

When something doesn't seem right, we do something; we tell someone.

SUN DEVILS ALWAYS GET CONSENT

Consent is:

- actively given
- a mutual agreement between partners
- clearly communicated
- voluntary and must not be forced or coerced

Silence is not consent.



Communicate about consent

- Express your intentions clearly.
- Ask about your partner's desires. Listen to the response.
- Make sure that you agree about the type of contact you will have.
- Check in with each other frequently.
- Respect any limits that are set. Don't push for more than is agreed to willingly.
- Consent can be withdrawn at any time.
- If consent is withdrawn, or if the person doesn't consent, stop what you are doing immediately.

Consent is not possible when alcohol or other drugs are involved.

Remember: any sexual activity without consent is sexual violence.

Sexual Violence Awareness and Response

National surveys report that one in five women and one in sixteen men experience attempted or completed sexual assault while in college.

Arizona State University is committed to the health and safety of our community. We work to ensure that all students, faculty and staff feel safe on campus and have the opportunity to engage in and benefit from the many programs and activities available at ASU. The policies establishing the standards of conduct for our community prohibit a wide range of sexual misconduct, which includes sexual violence and sexual harassment. ASU takes all reports of such conduct seriously and is committed to taking appropriate action to hold violators accountable and to prevent any recurrence.

Sexual violence, sexual harassment, stalking and relationship violence have a profound impact on a victim's academic, social, working, and personal life, and negatively affects victims' friends and families, other students, co-workers, and members of the university community. To combat this complex social problem, ASU provides a variety of **resources and educational programs** designed to prevent sexual violence and other acts of sexual misconduct, including sexual harassment, provide information about what to do when an incident has occurred, and increase awareness of campus and community resources for support and response.

ASU takes these situations seriously and works to continuously improve our prevention, response, support, and investigation of sexual harassment, sexual assault and other forms of sexual violence. This website includes on campus and off campus resources for individuals impacted by these issues.
