CALL TO ORDER

The meeting was called to order at 3:00 p.m. by University Senate President Elisa Kawam, who welcomed the senate members. A quorum was established by Maria Coca.

APPROVAL OF THE MINUTES

The minutes of April 28, 2025, were approved.

REPORTS

1. Report from University Senate President Kawam – University Academic Council (UAC). President Kawam opened the first Academic Senate meeting of the 2025–2026 year by emphasizing the Senate's ongoing commitment to capacity building. She noted that although the work of the Senate may not always be visible or flashy, it is impactful and essential. Her vision of "Shared Governance 2.0" encourages collaboration among nearly 6,000 faculty members, with a focus on relationships—within the Senate, with the broader university community, and with the administration.

President Kawam stressed the importance of consultation, small-group work, and curriculum development as pillars of Senate progress. She called on senators to share the workload and ideas, reaffirming her commitment to transparency, integrity, and follow-through. A new Senate Slack channel has been launched to foster informal, collegial communication, and upcoming events include the Academic Assembly and the ABOR meeting later this month.

- 2. Parliamentarian Denise Bodman provided a reminder that the Slack channel is hosted on a university-managed platform and is therefore subject to public records laws. While useful for informal exchanges, it should not be used for formal Senate business (e.g., voting, deliberations, or polling).
- **3. Provost Nancy Gonzalez**, though away on university business, sent a video message in which she expressed her appreciation for the Senate's contributions. She reported another year of **record-setting enrollment** and shared that the university remains in a **fiscally sound** position, though continuing to exercise **caution**.
- 4. Dr. Sally Morton, Executive Vice President of the ASU Knowledge Enterprise, addressed recent uncertainty in federal research funding, noting that only 90 of ASU's 2,700 active projects have been affected. She assured the Senate that ASU is responding proactively—advising Pls, collaborating with deans, expanding partnerships, and



monitoring evolving federal policies. Dr. Morton emphasized that **research remains a national priority** across political lines. She also explained a new policy in which **Research Infrastructure and Development (RID)** funds will be split **50/50** between units and central administration to enhance budget stability. ASU continues to be a **lead plaintiff in several federal lawsuits** challenging executive orders related to research.

- 5. Dr. Anne Jones, Vice Provost for Undergraduate Education, reported on ASU's continued growth in international student enrollment. With 183,000 students enrolled last year, she emphasized that growth is both intentional and strategic. ASU is committed to supporting international students with flexible enrollment options and ongoing communication, noting that the current situation for international students is becoming the new normal.
- 6. Chris Fiscus, Vice President for Media Relations and Strategic Communications, highlighted recent efforts to engage the public around the value of higher education. He shared success from the campaign "Is College Worth It?," which has garnered 7 million views across platforms. The university is leveraging social media, influencers, and traditional media, and faculty are encouraged to submit story ideas or initiatives for promotion.
