2. Call to Order

- a. Welcome from Senate President Helene Ossipov

3. Provost's Report-Rob Page

Jim O'Donnell is the new university librarian, he will start on February 6, 2015. State universities are expecting a reduction in state funding. In addition to state funding, the university receives funding from other sources such as tuition, summer session, ASU Online, grants, bonds and the ASU Foundation. The university's total budget is \$2.2 billion. Senators asked about the budget reduction and impact on merit increases and where cuts will be made. The Provost responded that the impact is not known as the actual cuts are not known. In-state tuition is not going up.

4. Informational Reports

a. Todd Halvorsen: New York Times Curricular Resources

Todd Halverson stated that there are 82,000 access points to the *New York Times*. He suggested faculty go to the ASU libraries and do a search for the *New York Times* and learn more about resources for education, including their curriculum available on leadership and for first year undergraduates. They also host the *New York Times* Café discussion series on the downtown campus. A workshop is scheduled for February 26, 2015 to provide more in-depth information about their resources.

b. Gordon Wishon: Chief Information Officer, University Technology Office

Gordon Wishon reported that several improvements to the ASU infrastructure include upgrades to the network infrastructure and the addition of several thousand wireless access points. The Helpdesk is back in-house. Future improvements include improving wireless access density, rewiring network cabling in 21 buildings, and data system security. The University is instituting an encryption policy to protect sensitive information. A no-cost identity repair service and Microsoft Office for up to five devices will be available for faculty and staff. LiveSafe is a mobile app focused on student safety, allowing for anonymous tip reporting and communication with the ASU Police; a feature called SafeWalk informs designated contacts of safe travel on campus.

5. UAC Chair's Report - Helene Ossipov

Helene announced this month senator's spotlight features Konstantinos Tsakalis. The Senate extends condolences to Senator David Wells and his family. Jodi Preudhomme is the new Title IX Coordinator for the university who will oversee anything related to sexual violence at ASU. Barry Ritchie will be offering promotion and tenure workshops, a link will be posted on the Senate website. The Centennial Professorship award recognizes an assistant or non-tenure track faculty that has made a positive impact at ASU. It is a very prestigious and generous reward. February 9 is the deadline to apply or nominate.

8. Committee Reports

a. University Services and Facilities Committee-Thomas Schildgen

The committee is developing a survey for distribution to faculty for input on facilities as well as campus safety and high performance computing. Parking garage technology is being upgraded or replaced.

b. Personnel Committee-Shari Collins

The committee motion concerning non-tenure eligible faculty promotion was presented today as a first read. They will be addressing overload pay, course swapping and iCourse limits.

c. Committee on Committees-Chris Kyselka

The academic assembly elections will take place in February as candidate selection has concluded and election preparations are underway.

d. Data Archiving Work Group-Michael Rosenberg

The committee is working on policies regarding data archiving and data openness. They are in the process of sharing a report and policy draft and obtaining feedback from units.

e. Student Faculty Policy Committee-Len Gordon

The committee's motions regarding managing academic integrity violations and how long students should wait for absent instructors are presented as a first read today. The committee is reviewing other issues such as student debt, double majors, and changing the number of hours required for degree completion.

9. Open Forum

Kevin Ellsworth asked about faculty teaching overloads and whether they are prohibited. He commented that ACD 510 – 02 allows overloads for supplemental pay, especially for those with a low base salary. Provost Ritchie responded that he is not aware of plans to limit overloads.
